## Email accounts can be hacked

I am always concerned internet safety and identity theft.

As you know, Governor Palin's email address was hacked and the contents were posted on the internet for the world to see. A complete stranger did the hacking. That's how easy it is to hack an e-mail account.

Your email address is out there. Often times, your user ID is part of the email address. All a person has to do is reset the password. And, as it turns out, it isn't that difficult to do. The Palin hacker just created a new one using Yahoo's reset feature.

To reset the password, the hacker answered a security question. He guessed at it based on public information. If a person knows you well, they could easily do the same. Or, maybe the answer can be found with a Google search.

The net of it is, don't answer the security question honestly. Don't use your anniversary, birthday, address, or phone number as a password. For your mother's maiden name, you could answer "no one needs to know" or MYOB@MYOB.com. The system doesn't care it makes no sense.

I always use a fictitious name and address. The last thing I need is to lose my identity or have problems with hackers.

You can protect existing accounts by resetting your security question answer. Yahoo won't let you, but Gmail and Hotmail will.

Use a strong password. There is software available that can crack passwords. Basically, it runs through every word in the dictionary looking for a match. This is why you are often encouraged to incorporate numbers into the password. There are no such words in the dictionary.

If you want to be really creative, use a sentence that is easy for you to remember, like "I work at NDSU 2008." Take the first letter of each word "IWAN2008" and make a password. It's the recommended 8 characters (or more) long. Or, to really have fun "I2W0A0N8" uses all the same characters. Neither one makes a bit of sense.

If you have trouble remembering passwords, there are password-management programs like KeePass or LastPass. Your passwords are encrypted and it requires a master password to open the database. Pageonce is a web-based password-management program.

You should change your password regularly. And clean out your browser's saved data regularly. This includes the cache, saved forms, cookies and passwords.
